Nora Jacquez has a Ph.D in Spanish and was a professor of Spanish and Latin American Studies at Oberlin College in Ohio. At forty seven she decided to go to law school. She graduated from the University of Colorado School of Law and practiced as a partner in the law firms, Jacquez and Arnold and Judd, Jacquez, Arnold and Durfee in Denver for eight years. During that time she practiced Worker's Compensation and Personal Injury Law. She also represented a community in the San Luis Valley against a gold mine. Part of this work was pro bono. She later served as part of a task force with members of the state regulatory agency and the mining industry to revise the hard rock mining laws in Colorado. The revision submitted by the task force was approved unanimously by the Colorado Legislature.

She then decided she wanted to see the world and have experiences she had always dreamed of. She has traveled to over ninety countries, trekking in Nepal, backpacking in Patagonia, hiking in the Alps, the Dolomites and the Tatra Mountains in Poland. She walked across England and did the Camino de Santiago in Spain. She crossed the Karakorum Highway, the highest road in the world, from Islaamabad, Pakistan to Kashgar in China. She volunteered in a Community Law Center in Christ Church New Zealand. She taught English as a volunteer to Tibetan Monks and Nuns in

Dharamsala, India. Four years ago she volunteered at a nursing home in Taybeh, Palestine. She has worked with Seniors at a Center in Avignon, France and once even apprenticed to a carpenter in Oaxaca, Mexico where she lives three months of the year. In Denver she volunteers with The Rocky Mountain Immigration Advocacy Network and Project Angel Heart. She speaks French, German and Spanish and has studied in Austria, England, France, Mexico and Spain. She has authored four books and several articles. Her books include THE GREAT TAMALE WAR AND OTHER TALES, and BRAVO, STORIES MEDIUM TRUE, two books of bilingual short stories, All the proceeds are donated to organizations dedicated to social justice and non violence.

In 2008 she was selected to be an Artist in Residence as a story teller at Rocky Moumtain National Park. In 2013 she wrote in Spanish and English a dramatic monologue on her ancestral grandmother who lived in five different cultures in the 18th century. The monologue was a fund raiser for children's programs to a sold out house in Oaxaca, Mexico. She then participated in Oaxaca's International Storytelling Festival. Nora presented this monologue to the Taos Historical Society in Taos where her ancestral grandmother, Maria Rosa Vialpando was born. In June 2013 she presented her monologue at the Museo de las Americas in Denver, Colorado. In October, 2013 she performed the monologue at Fort Lewis College in Durango, Colorado where she currently serves on the Board of Trustees.
